Have you been at a place in your life where you wanted to throw your hands in the air and shout, "Lord help! I'm not sure how much more I can handle!" Ed and Jennie Watson know that feeling, and certainly had reason to shout these words from the rooftops. In 2011, the couple relocated to Blacksburg, VA where Ed had accepted a position with Virginia Tech. With a well-developed career in construction and design of academic facilities across the state of Virginia, Ed was ready for the challenges that a major university would offer, and Jennie, ready to support Ed and his career goals, resigned from her teaching job, sold their home in Midlothian, and joined Ed for this new adventure. For most of 2011, this couple drove from Blacksburg to Richmond (to visit their son), to Raleigh (to visit their daughter), or to Greensboro (to visit Jennie's aging parents) every weekend. Then, in April 2012, the unthinkable occurred. Jennie's parents passed away within the span of only six days, with a funeral for her father on Good Friday, followed by a funeral for her mother on the following Friday. Can you imagine the loss of both parents in the course of one week? It gets worse. Two weeks later. Ed found himself without a job. So in three-week's time, Jennie lost both parents, Ed is without a job, and there is a lot of uncertainty about where they might live or

work. That's a lot of stress to deal with! How did they cope? To answer that question you've got to know a little bit about this couple.

Jennie is from Alabama, and her parents moved around quite a bit due to multiple job relocations from Dothan, to Montgomery, to Birmingham, and finally to Huntington, WV. While Ed also



grew up in Huntington, one did not know the other, going to different churches, high schools and such. After high school, Jennie attended Marshall University and Ed went to West Virginia Tech. One Friday afternoon, Ed decided to visit a friend at Marshall, and unknowingly, stopped a young lady on campus to ask for directions. That young lady was Jennie; Ed jokes that he continues to ask her for directions! They met in October 1978, and started dating Thanksgiving weekend. After four or five months, they stopped dating, Ed's mother passed away,

Jennie went on to graduate school and moved out-of-state. Ed graduated from WV Tech in civil engineering and started a career in the Huntington-Charleston area as a sales engineer. Some four years later. Ed visited the church that Jennie had attended when she was growing up in Huntington. On that Sunday, Jennie was in town visiting her family, and she and her mother walked together across the church parking lot, following the service. Ed caught a glimpse of Jennie and walked over to her car. They talked a few minutes about where each now lived, how long it had been since they last saw one another, and Jennie went home. Before she and her mother arrived home from church, Jennie's mother asked. "Would you ever again go out with Ed?" to which Jennie replied, "Heavens no! Never again!" That afternoon, Ed called her parents' house, and asked Jennie if she would go out with him - and she said, "Yes!" They started dating (again) at Thanksgiving, a few months later, Ed asked Jennie to marry him, and they married on July 30, 1983 in Huntington.

The Watson's have two children. Julie, is married; she and her husband, Curtis, live in Wake Forest, NC and have two children. Ellie (4 years old) and Cooper (17 months). David, Ed and Jennie's son, lives and works in Los Angeles, CA. Jennie is a Speech Language Pathologist and works in the Chesterfield County Public Schools and Ed works as a Director of Public Works for the city of Hopewell. Amid all of the moves in their married life, from Huntington, to Petersburg, VA, to Durham, NC, to Richmond, to Blacksburg, and back to Midlothian, the one constant in the Watson's life has been their faith. They have a strong faith as both of them grew up in church. That leads us to the answer of how they were able to cope with that terrible season of their lives when Jennie lost her parents and Ed lost his job. They were able to get through it because they looked to the Lord. They pulled together and prayed together. On his desk as he looked for work each day, there was a magnet with a paraphrase of Jeremiah 29:11, "Look forward to each day, for God has such great plans to prosper you and give you an incredible future." The Watson's trusted in this scripture, but time passed, and while there were interviews, there were no job offers for 12 months. Then one day, Jennie said something that changed their prayer life. She told Ed, "We need to ask God to send you to a place where they really need you." That place was Hopewell. I asked Ed if he felt the Lord led him there

Ed replied, "No. Not at first. I thought the job in Hopewell would be a 'place holder' job, and a better job would come along. I really didn't see a ray of light in my job, but as time passed, I found I was beginning to make a difference. Interestingly, I did get other job offers. And, for the last six years, I have chosen not to accept new employment offers because Hopewell is where I need to be. This job is not the one I would have picked for myself, but it's where the Lord wanted me. I've come to realize that I'm not doing this job to 'pad my resume,' but I am there to serve, and when I leave, hopefully that city will be a better place."

There are a couple of things to take from Ed and Jennie's story. First and foremost, their faith sustained them through a very difficult period in their life's journey. Interestingly, they believe the uncertainty of this time was made even harder because they didn't have a Church family to rely on for support. Job relocation, job loss, and countless trips out-of-town to take care of Jennie's parents, were ahead. But, they looked to the Lord in their time of need, and trusted in God's provision and guidance.

The other takeaway is that so often in life, the hand of the Lord is only visible by looking back. Ed and Jennie prayed for a place where Ed would be needed, and Ed took a step of faith taking the job in Hopewell. He didn't know if it was the right thing at first, but over time, God has shown him that he did make the right choice. It's also important to note that the job the Lord had for Ed was not one that Ed would have chosen for himself. Ed says that he continues to learn that life is about getting on board with "God's script" and that means "we have to let go of our own script."

The Watson's are a lovely couple, gifted with a lot of faith, wisdom, and a heart for others. One of their passions is actively participating in and facilitating small groups. Ed and Jennie will start a small group in their home on Sunday evening, beginning May 19th. This small group will start-up on a 6-week study titled, If You Want to Walk on Water, You've Got to Get Out of the Boat by John Ortberg. It's a study on how to deepen your faith with the Lord and consider the incredible potential that awaits you outside your comfort zone. How to take steps, even risky steps, on the waters of faith to find Jesus waiting to meet you for the adventure of your life. This is a walk this couple has lived! We hope you'll want to join in on their hospitality, and become a part of this small group. The group will meet from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m. Sunday evenings, and there will be plenty of good food too! The Watson's have a small sign in their home that reads, "Find Joy in the Journey." I suspect if you sign up for their small group, you'll find a good deal of joy as you journey together. Memorial Association News

The upkeep, maintenance of the cemetery and sale of grave sites is the responsibility of the Bethel Baptist Church Memorial Association. At this time there are approximately 25 single grave sites and 1 Double grave site remaining in the cemetery. These sites can only be purchased by Bethel church members. The price for purchasing a grave site is \$500. There are three ways the grave site can be utilized.

- . Someone can purchase a grave site and bury one person (with casket and vault) for \$500.
- When purchasing a grave site (prior to any burial) one may indicate they wish the site to be used for a double death burial. This means 2 individuals can be buried in the same site, one on top of the other. The grave site must be dug approximately 5 feet deeper than for a single burial. The price of the grave site to be used in this manner is \$1000.
- If the purchaser and family are to be cremated one may purchase the grave site and inter the ashes of one individual for \$500. The ashes of up to 8 individuals may be interred in one grave site. However, the cost to inter each individual is \$500, to be paid to the Memorial Association prior to each burial.

The Memorial Association is not in the business of advertising to sell grave sites. However, with the number of new church members we felt It may be beneficial to explain this to the congregation. If you are interested in purchasing a plot in Bethel's cemetery please contact me.

A Note From Your Associate Pastor and Music Minister: by Gayle Taylor



"April Showers Bring May Flowers: What's the Connection Between Jesus and Plants?"

The old saying, "April showers bring May flowers" rings true for us in Virginia. The many showers we endured in April have brought forth the tulips, daffodils, and hyacinths as well as the dogwood and red maple blossoms. A softness in the air accompanies the perfumes of the flowering plants which make May a delightful month. Recently, as I breathed in the scent of the flowers, I began to think about the connection between Jesus and plants, wondering what the Scriptures would reveal.

In **Isaiah 11:1**, this passage is used to reference the anticipated Messiah: "A shoot will come up from the stump of Jesse; from his roots a Branch will bear fruit." The shoot, a tiny piece of a plant, represents the long-awaited Messiah, whose life will birth a following of early disciples and countless Christians.

Sometime after his birth, the Wise Men searched for the Messiah, bringing frankincense and myrrh as gifts, according to **Matthew 2:11**: "On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh." Both frankincense and myrrh derive from resin harvested from the bark of sturdy trees. These resins have several purposes including perfume, medicinal, and sacred, mentioned in both the Old and New Testaments. Both of these plant-based gifts symbolize the importance of Jesus' birth and help to anoint Jesus' ministry.

After the visit from the Magi, Jesus' father, Joseph, received three warnings through dreams. The first dream indicated to Joseph that Jesus' birth caused concern from Herod, so the little family needed to retreat to Egypt. After Herod's death, Joseph received a second message which told him to return to Israel. The new ruler, however, the son of Herod, caused Joseph fear, so in the third dream, he was instructed to take the family to Galilee. He settled the family in the town of Nazareth. **Matthew 2:23** says, "So was fulfilled what was said through the prophets: 'He will be called a Nazarene.'" Interestingly, the word *Nazareth* is probably related to the Hebrew word used in Isaiah 11:1 for 'sprout.' So even Jesus' homeland gives Him an association with plants.

As Jesus' ministry on earth began to close, he instructed his disciples to obtain a donkey and its colt for him. He rode into Jerusalem and the people placed their coats and palm branches on the road. Mark 11: 8-9 says, "Many people spread their cloaks on the road, while others spread branches they had cut in the fields. Those who went ahead and those who followed shouted, "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!" This followed a Jewish custom during the Festival of Tabernacles. The import in Mark, however, is that the people were identifying *Jesus* as the Lord. This public proclamation is relived each year as we celebrate Palm Sunday, forever identifying Jesus with the palms and to His honored position as our Lord.

to God.

Several plant associations with Jesus emerge during His last days on earth. In Mark 14: 3, while Jesus is visiting Simon the Leper, he is anointed by a woman who "came with an alabaster jar of very expensive perfume, made of pure nard. She broke the jar and poured the perfume on his head." Those present at this display wondered why this occurred and criticized the waste. Jesus, however, countered with this message: "She did what she could. She poured perfume on my body beforehand to prepare for my burial." Nard comes from a flowering plant, its essence being used at the altar in the Jewish Temple in biblical times as well as a preservative for a body being prepared for burial. Romans also poured the oil of nard to anoint the head of an honored person. Both Jesus' birth and life were anointed in a public fashion, creating a sign for all to see that Jesus represented the royalty, the very image of God. Jesus, as a representation of God, however, created a challenge to the Roman government. After being handed over to the Roman authorities, Jesus was questioned and put under arrest. In Matthew's account, Jesus admits to being Christ, the Son of God. For this, he received cruel treatment and the pronouncement of crucifixion. The Roman soldiers spat upon him, hit him, and put a crown of thorns upon him before leading him away to be crucified (Matthew 27: 27-31). Thorns represent pain and suffering, but they also indicate a curse. In Genesis 3, after Adam and Eve sinned, God curses the ground with "thorns and thistles" (verse 17). Christ took on the curse of death for us. Galatians 3:31 states, "Christ redeemed us from the curse of the law by becoming a curse for us, for it is written: 'Cursed is everyone who is hung on a tree." Of course, Christ did not deserve any curse for He is perfect, but He took on that representation in order to save those who believe in Him.

Finally, after His death by crucifixion, Christ's body is taken down by Joseph of Arimathea. Nicodemus accompanies him and brings "a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about seventy-five pounds" (**John 19: 39**). They use this mixture to cover Jesus' body: "the two of them wrapped it, with the spices, in strips of linen (verse 30). "At the place where Jesus was crucified, there was a garden, and in the garden a new tomb, in which no one had ever been laid. Because it was the Jewish day of Preparation and since the tomb was nearby, they laid Jesus there" (verses 41-42).

This garden could not contain Him, however, for He was not there when Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome arrived in the morning to anoint His body with spices. Instead, the women encountered two men wearing clothes "that gleamed like lightning stood beside them...in their fright the women bowed down with their faces to the ground, but the men said to them, 'Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here; he has risen! (Luke 24: 3-6). Later, Christ reappears to Mary Magdalene and to the disciples, reassuring them that He was not dead. He commissions the disciples in Galilee on a mountain and reminds them "And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age" (Matthew 28:20).

From the anticipation of birth to resurrection, plants of all descriptions lace the Scriptures' retelling of Christ's story. His story unfolds like a flower, blooming with sweetness, beauty, and the promise of life everlasting. In this month of May flowers, let us reflect on Christ's story and imitate His qualities that are fragrant


