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In the 8th chapter of Romans the Apostle Paul talks about the many hardships he faced in life as he took the glorious message of Christ to the Gentiles. In Romans 8:35 he mentions how he faced hardship, distress, persecution, famine, and peril. Then in verse 37 he exclaims, "No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us." I love that line, "More than conquerors." With Christ in our lives we can rest assured that we are more than conquerors. We are overcomers, people who can face the difficulties of life and Christ can use those difficulties to grow our faith and our character. This month I offer you the story of one of Bethel's conquerors, Mary Florence. These are her words.

My name is Mary Louise Florence, formerly Mary Louise Morgan. I am one of three children. When I was born my mother decided she didn't want to be a mom, especially when she didn't know the identity of my father. I was raised by my grandmother, who adopted my mother, and later became my legal guardian. A couple years went by and my mother had two more girls that were also raised by my grandmother, their fathers were unknown as well.

From a young age I saw my grandmother struggle to raise three girls. She worked full time and still continued to get us where we needed to be, whether it was practice or school functions. To complicate matters even more, my grandmother was a hoarder, to the point we didn't have running water, a kitchen to cook in, or proper sleeping arrangements. We had to crawl in a window to get into the house, we ate out almost every night at McDonald's and if she couldn't afford it we often charged our meal until she could. We showered at the YMCA, when this wasn't possible due to time constraints or transportation we would use water jugs and bathe the best we could outside. I personally slept on a love seat couch that was on a pile of clothes for most of my childhood.

I went to the same daycare from 18 months to 12 years, when I "aged out". Knowing my family struggles, the owner let me come in and help out to make a little extra money. This often went back to my grandmother to help with gas and other expenses. When I was 14 my grandmother strongly suggested

I get a work permit to help pay the bills. I started working at McDonald's the day I turned 14 and the money went back to my grandmother. It wasn't much, but I did what I could to help take care of my grandmother and two younger sisters.

Once a year we were court ordered to see my mother. We would drive three hours to see her for what felt like 10 minutes, she often took us on her drug deals. I could see she wanted nothing to do with us. We would drive back home and I remember feeling unwanted, let down, and ashamed about myself. I watched my grandmother struggle to get us there and force us to see her and try to be happy, however it was hard to hide the feelings that I had.

It wasn't until I was 15 that I really felt the Lord rescue me. On August 11th 2006, I met Jake. While Nana took us to church it really wasn't a lesson or learning, it was more like childcare. We learned the traditional Bible stories, but not what it meant to be saved by the Lord. Looking back it's easier to understand. August 11th was the turning point in my life. I got out of my mother's vicious cycle of having kids and running away. I no longer felt unwanted. I started going to church with Jake and his family because I wanted to. I really listened to the sermons. I started reading the Bible and daily verses that I had on my phone app. I started to feel my life coming together, rising from the ashes. All the things that I struggled with started to fade and I started living for my Lord and Savior. I felt safe in the Lord and His Word. My favorite Bible verse is Psalm 119:105, "Thy word is a lamp unto my feet and light unto my path." I think of this daily and I know that the struggles that I endured were necessary for me to become the person I am today. John 1:5 says, "The light shines in the darkness, the darkness has not overcome it." The light of Christ shined in my darkness and I overcame.

"Counting the Cost: Liberty or a Prison" by Gayle Taylor

We enjoy our various freedoms in the United States every day and celebrate these especially during July 4. Many of us will observe the day in one or more of these ways: shooting off fireworks, gathering with friends and family for a cook-out, taking off for a beach vacation, and displaying the American flag. All of these activities usher in the holiday vibe that is Independence Day, the day where we recall how America established her freedom from the rule of Great Britain. Even before, 1776, however, another type of war against tyranny was being waged by ministers of the Baptist faith.

Before the American Revolution, Baptists, as well as other religious denominations, were not highly regarded. The Church of England remained the accepted faith-based institution. Because of some violent supporters of the Church of England seeking to eliminate what they viewed as opponents of the true faith, defenders of the Baptist faith emerged and endured suffering for the cause of Christ through heroic efforts. This defense took place throughout the colonies and Virginia was no exception. One such defender was Rev. James Ireland, a Baptist minister in Culpeper County. Listen to his story...

Scottish-born James Ireland emigrated to America as a young man after a "youthful indiscretion." Upon arrival in Northern Virginia, he was able to get employment as a school teacher. He did not live a Christian lifestyle, even though he had been raised in a godly home in the Presbyterian faith. In fact, his secular activities worried a friend of his so much that he asked Ireland (whom he knew to enjoy poetry) to think about his life and to compose a poem on a topic of religion. Ireland wrote a poem about Heaven and quickly realized he had no hope of getting into Heaven. He became a changed man and after his conversion and baptism, he became licensed to preach. He spoke authoritatively and passionately and received many invitations to preach. He accepted an invitation in Culpeper County, but was warned that authorities would likely put him in jail if he preached (which they did). Ireland in recounting this incident wrote: *"I counted the cost, freedom or confinement, liberty or a prison; it admitted of no dispute. Having adventured all upon Christ I determined to suffer all for Him."*

Even during this stint in jail, however, Ireland was not deterred from proclaiming the gospel. He continued to preach through the bars of his cell window. Angered and determined

to suppress his voice, the jailer, as well as local churchmen attempted to suffocate Ireland by putting gunpowder under the jail. This effort failed to injure Ireland, but did damage the jail. The jailer also owned a local tavern and paid some drunks to assault Ireland. A doctor was bribed to put poison in some medicine Ireland needed for a fever. Even more debasing, as Ireland preached passionately through his cell window, two detractors tried to extinguish his voice by urinating in his face. Regardless of all of these reprehensible activities, Ireland remained steadfast on his mission for Christ and continued to preach and actually converted many, including high-ranking citizens. In addition to the sermons he delivered verbally, he wrote letters that contained messages about the gospel. These letters were designated by him by the title "From My Palace in Culpeper." James Ireland was not the only Baptist minister to suffer jail time. In fact, he was one of thirty Baptists imprisoned in Virginia during 1768-1770. After the William and Mary's Toleration Act passed in 1770, however, Ireland was released from the jail. He had served five months after enduring daily persecution in this county once known as the "devil's stronghold."

Remarkably, once released from prison, Ireland continued his ministry in the county, planting churches in the area. He became the pastor of a Baptist meetinghouse in Culpeper, once known as the Buckmarsh Baptist Church (now known as Berryville Baptist Church) where he served from 1788-1806. Ireland is buried in an unmarked grave at the original church location, but the Virginia Historical Society placed a marker in the cemetery at [Berryville Baptist Church](#). Included on his marker are these words:

"In gratitude for the blessings of spiritual religion and freedom of conscience won in part through his sufferings this memorial is erected by the Baptists of Virginia on the one hundred and twenty-fifth anniversary of his death, May 5, 1931"

May we all remain grateful for our many freedoms, but especially for our religious freedom, and for the defenders of these freedoms not only in July but every month.

Book Club News

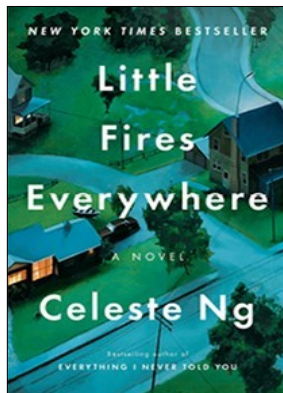
The Book Club is reading *Little Fires Everywhere* by Celeste Ng.

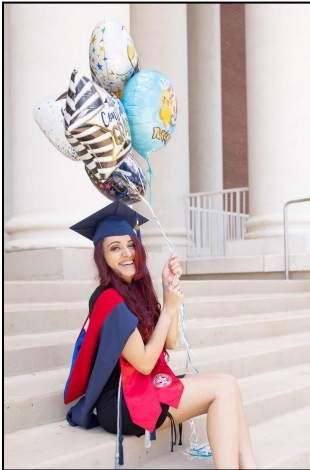

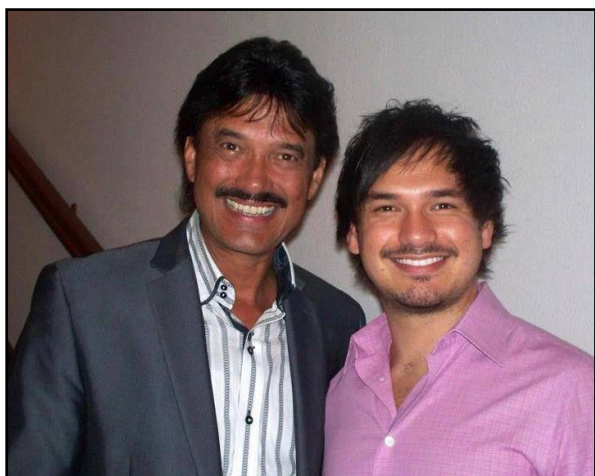


Jillian Elizabeth Ratliff
