To this end I'm excited to announce the formation of Bethel's first Prayer and Listening (PALs) Group. A PALs group consists of a group of people who are dedicated to the idea of coming together to share each other's stories, to listen to one another and pray for each other.

The PALs group idea emerged from a conversation I had with Brian Moseley. Brian is married to his lovely wife Becky and they have two children Austin and Trevor. Brian works for Moseley Electronics and is on our AV Team. He is a US Army Veteran and he bravely and honorably served our country by completing three tours of duty. Brian served in Operation Enduring Freedom in Guantanamo Bay in 2002-2003. Then he served in Operation Vigilant Relief in 2005, which was a disaster relief operation in Mississippi after hurricane Katrina. Finally, Brian served in Operation Iraqi Freedom in Al Anbar, Iraq from 2007-2008. As you can imagine, Brian saw and experienced things that no one should have to see or experience. Tragically some of these things happened after Brian's tour of duties ended. Brian has lost three close Army friends to suicide. As a result of these experiences, the Lord has given Brian a burning desire to help our Veterans. Brian wants to bring Veterans together to support one another.

Thus the idea of a Veterans PALs group was born. We're going to offer a place where Bethel Veterans can come together to simply talk about their experiences, listen to one another and to pray for one another. Prayer and listening is one way we can offer love and care to our Veterans.

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Brian will have some help in this journey from Bud Hines. Bud is a US Army Veteran and he spent some time in a POW camp in Korea. Bud knows all too well the difficulty our soldiers face when they come home. I'm grateful for folks like Brian and Bud and I'd like to ask you to pray for them and for the Vets that may want to

participate in this group.

Baptist Rebellion! Virginia Baptist's Role in Religious Liberty

"I hold it that a little rebellion now and then is a good thing" ~ Thomas Jefferson

In Colonial America, oppressive taxation and restrictions imposed by England birthed a restlessness and unhappiness in the residents in the New World, spurring them to take action and to seek liberty. One area that emerged in Colonial America as a hot topic was freedom of religion. Already in place, of course, was the Anglican Church, the preferred church of England; however, other groups such as Baptists, Methodists, Quakers, Presbyterians, and others had surfaced. Taxes. collected to support the Anglican church, infuriated the Baptists, as were other restrictions imposed upon them such as the "requirement to register their meeting-houses and the endless red tape involved, and refusal of the authorities to acknowledge the validity of their marriages" (275-276). Frequently, Virginia Baptists incurred various types of persecution including being "whipped, fined, beaten by mobs... and/or exiled" as well as having their ministers imprisoned (270). Even when jailed, however, Baptist ministers frequently preached through their cell bars!

To voice their anger, the Baptists put together petitions which outlined reasonable arguments to give them the freedom to practice their beliefs. In 1784, with four Baptist associations in place, the members put together a General Committee composed of delegates to speak and to write petitions on behalf of the Baptists. One item that particularly angered the Baptists was the General Assessment Bill. This bill, proposed by the legislatures, recommended that a tax would be collected to support all religious organizations with the caveat that the citizens could determine to which denomination their taxes would support. The Baptists did not agree with this proposal, for they believed that church and state should be clearly separate. Their response to the General Assessment Bill asserted that "they no more wanted laws favoring than laws opposing them.... They asked that the government attend to its proper civil and economic duties and simply leave religion alone" (275). For Baptists, keeping the government separate from religion "seemed both scriptural and practical; but to many reared in the state church tradition, it seemed too radical to comprehend" (275).

Wow! Imagine Baptists standing as a radical voice! This religious voice of resistance, however, caught the ear of James Madison who composed "A Memorial and Remonstrance on the Religious Rights of Man." His arguments convincingly "sounded the death knell for general assessment in Virginia and probably in several other states as well" (279). The following year, 1785, Thomas Jefferson introduced a bill that would establish religious freedom in Virginia. This bill, known initially as Bill No. 82, "A Bill for establishing religious freedom" but which became the *Virginia Statute for Religious Freedom*. passed with Madison's support and the support of Baptists.

The legacy of this action to Jefferson appears substantial since he insisted that it be included as one of three achievements for which he wanted to be remembered, the other two being the *Declaration of Independence* and the creation of the University of Virginia. Additionally, the legacy of this bill to the rest of America is that it established a model that greatly influenced the position on religion that our country supports to this day.

The following is a portion from the *Virginia Statute for Religious Freedom:*

We the General Assembly of Virginia do enact [Be it enacted by the General Assembly] that no man shall be compelled to frequent or support any religious worship, place, or ministry whatsoever, nor shall be enforced, restrained, molested, or burthened in his body or goods, nor shall otherwise suffer, on account of his religious opinions or belief; but that all men shall be free to profess, and by argument to maintain, their opinions in matters of religion, and that the same shall in no wise diminish, enlarge, or affect their civil capacities.

Those early Virginia Baptists can take responsibility for having some rebellious blood in their veins and for having the courage to hold fast to their religious convictions. May we thank God that we can freely worship each week in the church of our choice without retribution or oppression from any entity.



The countdown is on! In just a few short weeks Bethel will turn into an African adventure where kids will explore the fact that Life is wild, but


